Born and bred right here in Sandpoint, the Timbersled is the brainchild of Alan Magnun, whose company first made advanced suspensions for snowmobiles. Intrigued, but not impressed by early attempts at dirt bike to snowbike conversions, he designed, engineered and built his own concept from scratch in 2009. It was aptly named “Mountain Horse.” By 2011, production models of the retitled Timbersled rolled off the line in Sandpoint. Public acceptance was instantaneous and huge. It even spawned a whole new industry called “Adventure Biking.” In 2015, the Polaris company said “thank you very much” to Alan, brought in its top engineering and marketing professionals to Sandpoint and made Timbersled extraordinarily popular everywhere it snows.

So, what makes a Timbersled so popular? For starters, its fun factor is off the charts. That’s because it’s more maneuverable, turns sharper and takes a lot less energy than a snowmobile. You can climb, wheelie, jump and plow through the steepest and deepest snow on sidehills or in tight woods. You’ll never forget the thrill of shredding mountain peaks as well as cruising pristine meadows.

“From big hits to new backcountry zones, I crave the ride up as well as the carve down,” says Colorado Timbersled devotee Jim Maropoulos. It can go where snowmobiles can’t or shouldn’t without a very strong expert at the controls. “I consider myself lucky to go to places that most

people will never see,” says Jeremy Deming, an Idaho Timbersled owner.

Bikes for tykes, too.
With models for all sizes and skills, Timbersleding is a family activity. Now the littlest ones don’t have to miss out on the excitement.

There are hundreds of access points on Forest Service land open to motorized travel in the area. There’s even a route up the back side of Schweitzer to the Sky House restaurant.

After the snow melts, just put the dirt bike tires back on and ride all summer long. *Details at Polaris.com/Timbersled*

New Beginnings Coming To Schweitzer

The future of Schweitzer is certainly looking up: up the mountain from an imaginatively conceived arrival center called Base Camp.

It all begins with a new high-speed detachable quad Leitner-Poma lift that is scheduled to be ready for the 2023 winter season. A snow bridge serviced by snowmaking equipment will be added to enable you to cross Schweitzer Creek and connect to the Happy Trails and Enchanted Forest ski runs or the current Fall Line parking facility. This new lift will double our uphill capacity from 1,200 to 2,400 per hour.



A new entry road from the fire station round-about to an expansive (1,400 spaces big) parking area has been cleared. The goal is to go from hard-to-find parking to easy-peasy parking by fall 2024.

Also on the planning board are expanded beginner/novice terrain with an accompanying lift plus guest amenities including a Day Lodge, Snowsports School, Child Care, Equipment Services, Ski Patrol, Nordic Center and Medical Facilities.

It’s all about enhancing our standing as the most desirable family-friendly recreational community in the Pacific Northwest.

New way to say “Welcome Home” to our employees.



Now referred to as Schralpenhaus, it’s Schweitzer’s response to providing affordable housing for the employees that make Schweitzer so special. In recent years, Sandpoint’s housing market has grown hotter than ever. Rising prices and fewer homes mean those who work here have a harder time finding available—and affordable—places to live.

The housing shortage has impacted every local organization, from schools and hospitals to companies like Schweitzer. They are all experiencing the same

problem: how to hire and retain quality employees when suitable housing for those employees is not available.

“Schweitzer is taking a leadership position in addressing this issue,” says Scot Auld, Human Resources Director at Schweitzer, “both in terms of recognizing the need to inspire creative solutions and the horsepower to get it done.”

One such solution? Provide the housing themselves. Schweitzer has already proven the idea works with its eight-bedroom “Hemlock House,” purchased and remodeled just for its employees. Now the more comprehensive employee housing neighborhood is underway, slated to open in late 2023.

“Because of Hemlock House, we were able to hire great people that normally might not be able to live here,” says Scot. “It was just one step toward Schweitzer’s larger goal: to develop and maintain sustainable hiring and retention practices.”

The new project will provide affordable high-quality apartment homes for Schweitzer’s seasonal workers as well as year-round staff. Close to shopping, dining and transportation, the attractive complex will include 84 pet-friendly one-, two-, and three-bedroom homes, featuring full kitchens, washers and dryers, access to bike and ski storage plus a rare convenience—a bathroom for every bedroom. There will also be covered picnic areas, outdoor play areas, walking paths and workout facilities. Future plans call for a full-service daycare facility. This housing is sure to make a positive impact on company personnel as well as Sandpoint itself.

“We’re the first in the community to do this on such a large scale,” Scot says. “We’re proud that we have been able to accomplish something of this magnitude in making affordable workforce housing a reality.”

I like expert terrain, but am not an extreme skier—narrow gullies are not for me. I also like the adventure of backcountry skiing and do a little Nordic as well. It’s all here at Schweitzer.

How does the rest of your family like their snow?

My daughter wants groomed runs. My son loves steep and fast, moguls and backcountry. The other son is in-between. Nina really is an expert skier. She can handle most anything.

Now that you’ve actually seen Schweitzer, what else appeals to you?

Schweitzer’s method of development. Everything in moderation, but with higher quality in mind. The Humbird hotel is a great example of that.

What about the town of Sandpoint and the lake?

I didn’t know about them before, but now that I’ve seen them, experienced them a little, and heard everybody rave about them, we’re going to increase our visits to include the summer, too. Besides spending more time at Schweitzer and Sandpoint, what else is in your future?

Too Nice, No Ice for Skating

If you're a fan of irony, you'll love this. Here in Sandpoint—home of Schweitzer's 300 inches of yearly snowfall fostering five months of fabulous skiing—it doesn't get cold enough to sustain outdoor ice skating.

Only a few weeks a year can ice skaters and hockey players find places on Lake Pend Oreille that are shallow enough to freeze over. The solution? Build an indoor ice rink. That's the goal of Sandpoint Community Center Corporation, whose board members include Schweitzer CEO Tom Chasse, Washington Trust Bank's Eric Paul and retired veterinarian Dr. Rob Pierce (who also founded the Sandpoint Hockey Association). The group is now working with the city of Ponderay and Northern Idaho ICE to build a facility in neighboring Ponderay.

Pierce, SC3 President, said, "We desperately need healthful, fun, and affordable wintertime activities, especially for kids. An all-weather facility can serve both kids and adults, during the day and into the evening."

Pierce said it's going to take public funds and private donations to create a financially sustainable, non-profit facility that can accommodate non-competitive free skating as well as figure skating and hockey.

The facility would also be used in non-winter months as a venue for concerts, events and roller skating.

You can also come up the backside of Schweitzer from nearby Priest Lake on snowmobiles or motorbikes. "It's a fun 45-minute ride up groomed trails," says frequent guest and snowmobiler Dave Spencer. "We go in a group of eight to ten friends, but we've had as many as 30 zoom up for lunch to experience the absolutely phenomenal views. Skiers we meet are surprised we came all the way from Priest Lake. Then they look out the window and say, 'Oh yeah, I get it.'"



Nordic Skiing: Flat out fun.



If you're confused between cross-country skiing and Nordic, don't be. They are really the same.

There are two types of Nordic skiing, however: classic and skate. "Classic is more like walking on skis, whereas skating is more like, well, skating on skis," says Arlene Cook, head of Schweitzer's ski patrol and Nordic expert. You want hard-pack conditions for the ultimate experience," Arlene says. This is a relatively safe winter sport: you can ski out in the early evening with headlamps to soak in a dazzling star-studded show you'll see nowhere else. New to the sport? Our Snowsports School can team you up with a personal coach who can show you how to get the most out of every outing. Both skate and classic equipment is available in the Demo Center. Out of Bounds? Outstanding!

Looking for some advanced adventure? Untracked powder? Carving through the trees? Welcome to backcountry skiing—the sport that breaks through the boundaries of traditional downhill. Thanks to Schweitzer's open boundary policy, you can head for the peace and quiet of its backside's pristine paradise. This more effort, more reward sport is not for the timid or the unskilled skier. You need to be prepared for plenty of exercise and a shipload of exhilaration. Here's what else you'll need. A partner to ski with—never go alone. Planned routes to ski down and hike back up. A backpack of survival stuff: water, food, a beacon, a shovel and skins for your boots. And most importantly, a lot of knowledge, experience and top-notch decision-making expertise. You should check The Idaho Panhandle Avalanche Center website for educational classes, weather, and area info. All set? Jump on the Lakeview or Great Escape lift and it's bombs away. There couldn't be a more natural way to have fun.

Here's a little-known fact: One of the world's most advanced STOL (short take-off & landing) adventure airplanes—the Kodiak—is handmade in the charmingly beautiful town of Sandpoint, Idaho, by Daher Aerospace. Family-owned since 1863, Daher also builds parts for a host of airline manufacturers including Airbus, Boeing, Dassault and Gulfstream. Daher designs and produces two ranges of single-turboprop aircraft—the Kodiak STOL, all-terrain, multi-purpose aircraft, and the TBM, the world's fastest single-engine turboprop airplane.

The latest in the Kodiak series, the 900, is the ultimate getaway aircraft. It's a perfect marriage of Kodiak's robust STOL capabilities with the TBM's speed and luxuriousness. It is built from the ground up in their Sandpoint factory.

Kodiak was originally created as a rugged aircraft to support humanitarian efforts in developing countries. Today the Kodiak is proven ideal for the intelligence, reconnaissance, firefighting, search and rescue, logistics services and charter

industries as well as private business and family travel.

"They are excellent for shorter hops where jets don't make sense," says Mark. "Say, a Seattle family is traveling to the San Juan Islands, the Kodiak is so much more efficient and economical, let alone eco-friendly."

Idaho's Frank Church Wilderness Area is another made-for-the-Kodiak

destination. "The only other way to go in is by horseback or by hiking," Mark adds. "It can go most places even other airplanes can't because it's built for very short, very narrow, unimproved airstrips."

What about Seattle to Schweitzer? It'll take you just 15 minutes longer than on a jet while burning a lot less fuel. Yet, you'll be flying in jet-like comfort and luxury. Inside, Kodiak's backcountry heritage has been thoroughly refined and elegantly designed. Space and payload are just



as unique. It holds 10 people or 3500 lbs. of gear with accommodations for lengthy loads like skis, snowboards and fishing poles.

"The backbone of our Sandpoint operation are the local people we've been able to hire and train." —Mark Brown, Kodiak's Director of Sales and Marketing as well as its chief demo pilot.

Kodiak is one of Sandpoint's largest businesses, employing 200-300 people for two decades. Their training program

enables them to hire people without requisite skills. "We're happy to have locals turn in their axes for rivet guns," Mark says. Daher's commitment to Sandpoint is growing. A \$2,000,000+ paint shop expansion is complete, and they are increasing production capabilities as well as becoming an authorized TBM service center.
