BOOTS THAT FIT LIKE A GLOVE



Keeping fit is a sure way to enjoy skiing to the fullest. The same goes for your boots. Making sure your boots fit right and feel right is vital to skiing with less effort, more skill and optimum comfort, whether you're blasting through backcountry powder or gliding through manicured glades.

"Our overall goal is to ensure your boots fully support how you ski, your skill level and what makes skiing fun and rewarding for you," says Zach Vollmer, owner of the Alpine Shops at Schweitzer and Sandpoint. "Well fitting boots will enable you to ski better, longer and more comfortably with less effort."

His personalized fitting process begins with an analysis of your foot. This includes measuring the width, length and volume of your foot. Your shoe size means little here.

The next step is critical: shell selection involving your foot size, width and the necessary flexibility that mirrors your skiing style, such as super aggressive or gentle cruising. They pair your foot shape and volume with appropriate low, medium or high-volume shells.

In the customization stage, the boot fitters will make any shell and liner modifications as well as select a recommended footbed—all to further improve the fit. You can also add boot heaters and heated socks to enhance your experience.


The final phase is all about you—your opinion of how the boot feels and how well it strikes a balance between comfort and performance.

"Putting your feet first will pay off big time, every time you slap on the boards," says Zach.







SCHWEITZER'S PAW PATROL

Meet Annie, Abbey, Murphy, and Maisie. These canny canines, along with their ski patrol handlers Leigh Bercaw, Steve Parsons, Galen May and Jeff Thompson, are vital members of the Schweitzer Avalanche Dog Rescue Team.

The dogs start their training at eight weeks old, and train year-round. It usually takes two or more full years of training for a dog to become certified to work at downhill runs at Schweitzer, and four to five years to work backcountry ski areas requiring uphill climbing.

Going far beyond the usual obedience training, these pups learn to ride ski lifts, toboggans and snowmobiles, and to be carried by handlers while skiing.

All of the dogs are female Labrador retrievers, regarded by many handlers as the best breed for the job due to their friendly personalities, collaborative working style, and high level of inbred instinctual skills for fetching and retrieving.

"These dogs are born to do this," says program director Leigh Bercaw. "They are happiest when they are doing this training, as they love the 'game' of finding and fetching hidden objects."

Since most people love dogs, the avalanche dogs are also enlisted to gather and maintain attention in ski safety talks. They help people—especially kids—stay engaged and remember crucial information.

The program was started by Jeff Thompson in 2017. It receives support from the non-profit organization Friends of Schweitzer Ski Patrol, which helps pay for the dogs' expenses, training costs and vet care. Dr. Tim's pet food company is a valued sponsor.





Boatload of Fun



Outdoor adventure is a very local family affair for Captain Eric "EJ" Jensen, owner of Lake Pend Oreille Cruises and its 43-foot, classically styled, 1960s former ferryboat, The Shawnodese.

"I've skied at Schweitzer since the early '90s," EJ says. "We spent weekends and holidays there at my parents' ski-house." After many summers as a charter boat captain in Sitka, Alaska, EJ was ready to come home to Sandpoint. It was then that his father-in-law, Ron Nova, a previous mountain manager at Schweitzer and a captain for Lake Pend Oreille Cruises, told him that the Shawnodese was available.

Now he captains the Shawnodese, which offers guided excursions and private cruises around this enormous sea-sized lake. Clawed out by Ice Age glaciers, Lake Pend Oreille is Idaho's largest lake at 43 miles long with 111 miles of shoreline. It's also the fifth deepest lake in America at 1,158 feet.

The Shawnodese features a fully enclosed lower deck, an open upper deck and a good-sized wheelhouse. All aspects of the boat, from the diesel engine to the safety features to the mahogany interior, have been upgraded. It now cruises at around six knots and is perfect for families, comfortably hosting guests of all ages.

E.J.'s wife, Courtney, works behind the scenes and has been known to help out on board as well. And Linda Mitchell, who co-founded the business with her husband in 1995, is still a member of the crew, sharing her deep knowledge of the lake on guided cruises.

There are a variety of cruises to suit different interests...starting with the popular Clark Fork Delta Cruise, which is your best opportunity to view the area's abundant wildlife. The Island and Eagle Watching Tour, a crew favorite, takes you around the four Islands of Hope to see a bald eagle sanctuary. The Lake History Cruise is especially great for families. Cruise a 10-mile loop near the shoreline while you learn about the amazing geology and history of Lake Pend Oreille. Kids can even be "Captain of the Day" and take a turn at the wheel! Private charter cruises are also readily available: for up to 36 guests. They've had business meetings, family dinners, and even weddings on the water. "Charters can be adjusted to accommodate personal preferences or spots they want to see" says Captain EJ. "Some of the most memorable private charters have been night cruises. Watching the full moon rise over the lake can be really magic."




Sites For Big Ideas



One of the most comprehensive and advanced animal care organizations in the country may be right here in Ponderay. The Better Together Animal Alliance offers an extraordinary range of services to support local cats and dogs—and the people who love them.

The organization's goal is to facilitate and foster connections between people and animals. This includes everything from sheltering lost pets to providing free and low-cost pet health care such as neutering and vaccinations to temporarily boarding animals when their owners are experiencing hardships.

Each year, the BTAA's Pet Food Bank hands out more than five tons of free food. At its state-of-the-art Animal Care Facility, dogs and cats awaiting adoption are cared for by a devoted cadre of 118 active volunteers, and veterinary staff. Over 8,000 animals are served annually.

The BTAA's "Home to Home" adoption on-line platform matches pets with new permanent or temporary homes, and helps smooth the transition, avoiding the stress of a stay at an animal shelter.

Their "Senior-to-Senior" adoption program pairs pets age seven and up with those over age 65, enhancing the lives of senior people and animals alike. The adoption fee is waived. And for cat lovers, the unique "Book Buddy" program allows children opportunities to practice their reading skills by reading to cats in the care center, benefiting both kitties and kiddies.

The humongous 7-pounder Spencer is referring to is called the Juke Box Special, named after the vintage juke box on site. Besides this meaty monster, other



handcrafted varieties include the meatless Schweitzer Ski Flake with feta and Asiago cheese and the Mexican with bean sauce, salsa and Pepperoncini peppers. Meat and vegetarian calzones, salads and sandwiches are on the menu as well.

Their sauces and dough are all handmade. They offer gluten-free crusts and can also make celiac pizzas. If beer is your go-to sidekick with pizza, they have microbrews for \$5 a pint.

So, what's the big deal? "Copious amounts of food at a great price," adds Spencer. "We're an ideal spot for large groups such as birthday parties, sports teams, and ski racers. Nobody goes away hungry."

BABS' PIZZERIA

"Grab a slice of New York right here in Sandpoint," says owner Babette "Babs" Tietjen. That's because her self-proclaimed "mom and pop shop" only makes handmade, hand-tossed New York style thin crust pizza.

"Our restaurant is run by three generations of women who have a love of cooking. In that sense, everything we do is like an extension of our kitchens at home."

"These light and airy treats are not deep-dish pizzas, but they are deeply delicious," says owner Mike Johnson. "On the other hand, our homemade meatball sandwiches contain nearly a pound of meat."

It's no surprise that their wine and beer list is brimming with European and local varieties. Pre-mixed cocktails are also available.

"Don't forget to order a side of our own honey-fermented chilis," suggests Mike. "It'll add an exotic touch to anything you're having."
